

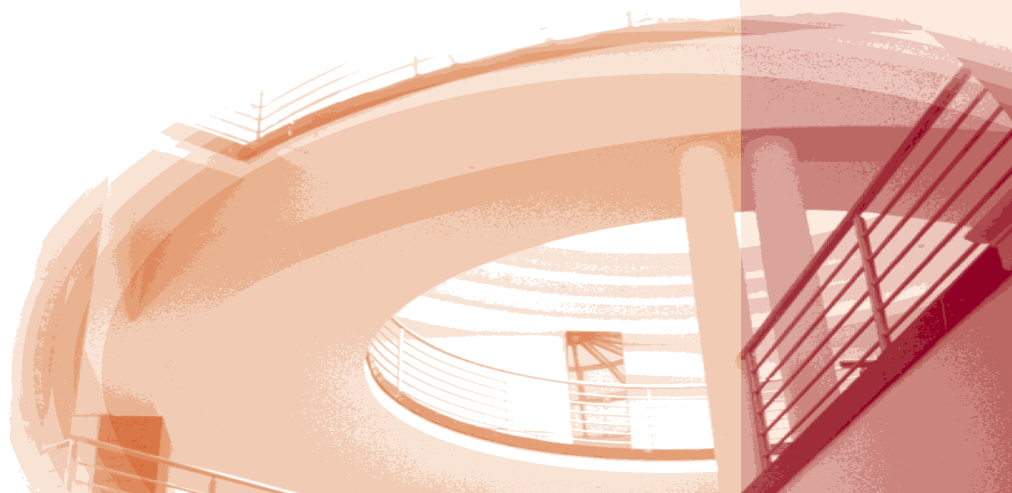

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## 1 FOREWORD

This is a report of a somewhat unusual time period. Embracing a year and a half, it covers CPS activities from January 2005 until July 2006. This is the result of a decision to shift in reporting from calendar to academic year. The former was followed in the formative years of the Center for Policy Studies, mainly due to our specific institutional biography. As we have become fully anchored in the academic life and organizational structures of Central European University, we have decided to adjust our reporting cycle towards the academic calendar of the University.

During the reporting period, our activities became diversified by opening new avenues of action and institutionalizing other ones. We nurtured a new masters program in public policy with three special tracks relying mostly on external funding. The program was transformed into an independent department at the end of the 2005/2006 academic year. We completed a number of comparative European research projects as consortium partners and are running another one in the field of post-socialist economic culture as a coordinator of the consortium. Our researchers helped to form new networks to investigate policy issues in which attention is still relatively modest (e.g. public integrity and rural development). We continued to work with smaller and bigger transnational organizations to address issues of the day with the aim of building teaching resources, test the validity of policy paradigms, and introduce self-reflexive inquiries into the practice of major policy making institutions (such as the World Bank). We continued to build up our on-line electronic library of policy papers and analysis for and from researchers dealing with the problems of post-socialist transformations.

We applied different strategies to better connect our main institutional partners and circles of clients and supporters. We continued to liaise with the Open Society Institute, most notably, by providing support to the International Policy Fellowship Program in knowledge management and dissemination, helping the Local Government and Public Service Reform Initiative shape pilot policy actions in a distinctive policy area, and assisting the Network Women's Program in training Roma women leaders in their policy analysis and advocacy skills. We participated in the formation of an association of young independent think tanks in the region, and shared our resources with other established ones.

Besides placing ourselves on the map of policy research community in Europe and the region, we are confident that our research, education support, and research capacity development work provide essential service to the community of Central European University in many ways. As our report reveals,

we help students to engage in relevant research projects, connect the academic community and management structures of the University to European research schemes, bring international research networks, debates, and prominent figures closer to research and teaching programs of the University.

A lot has been done in building the art of policy analysis and research in countries mastering post-socialist transformations, but a lot is yet to be done. We will continue our work and offer our results and resources to the use of the broader public. To this end, we are open to explore the possibilities of cooperation in new thematic areas and testing novel forms of activity with CEU academic units, Open Society Network programs, think tanks, and other policy communities in this part of the world and beyond.

## 2 RESEARCH PROJECTS

### 2.1 BRIDGING KNOWLEDGE AND POLICY

#### *Assessing the Impact of the International Fellowship Program on Policy Research Capacity Development*

Duration: January 2004 – December 2005

The project aimed at identifying the critical factors that influenced the impact of policy research carried out under the Open Society Institute's International Policy Fellowship Program. The work combined self-assessments from past fellows together with the views of selected members of the targeted policy audience. A series of case studies was produced to investigate issues such as the specific contribution of supporting networks, the promotion of empirical based policy making and tactics in negotiating terms of access to policy decision making. This research offers a valuable opportunity to consider the lessons that can be learned from a program designed to enhance both local professional capacities and to stimulate local demand. The main findings include: (1) a fellowship program can function as a research enhancement and technology transfer hub in carrying out policy research and as a knowledge creation instrument, (2) timing and the national policy context are central for the potential use and relevance of the research project and (3) the effectiveness of such a program depends on fellows' ability to integrate into as well as contribute to the knowledge value community in their specific policy fields. The project was co-funded by the Global Development Network.

### 2.1.1 *Impact of Research on Monetary Policy in Transition Countries*

The project analyzed the impact of research on the monetary policy sector in transitional countries, and the variations of degree of reliance on research-based evidence across transitional countries. Policymakers from national banks and research institutes of Bulgaria, Croatia, Czech Republic, Hungary, Poland, Romania, Slovakia and Slovenia were interviewed within the framework of the research project. The third and last phase of the project was not carried out, following a dispute about methodology with the funding body, the Global Development Network.

### 2.1.2 *Approaches to Measuring Capacity and Capacity-Building for Policy Research*

Within the framework of the Global Development Network's Bridging Research and Policy Project, the Center for Policy Studies was commissioned to write a background paper on "Approaches to Measuring Capacity and Capacity-Building for Policy-Research". The task was given to Daniel Pop and Stella Ladi, after the sad passing-away of Leslie Eliason, who had initiated the work. A draft of the paper was successfully presented at the January 2005 GDN conference in Dakar, Senegal, and the final paper was submitted in July 2005. The aim of the paper was to contribute to a clearer understanding of what capacities are needed to conduct policy-relevant research in the context of developing and transition countries, and to review the relevant experiences on the best approaches for capacity building.

## 2.2 ECONOMIC CULTURE

### *Eastern Enlargement – Western Enlargement: Cultural Encounters in the European Economy and Society after the Accession (DIOSCURI)*

Duration: June 2004 – May 2007

The DIOSCURI project is a Specific Targeted Research Project (STREP), funded under the 6<sup>th</sup> Framework Program of the European Commission, in the priority area Citizens and Governance in a Knowledge-based Society. The primary objective of the project is to explore the dynamics of cultural exchange between "East" and "West" in the European economy. It also identifies the main types of cultural encounters between the two halves of Europe during and after the Enlargement, maps the major cultural gaps and strategies to bridge them, and describes the fields, in which the new entrants can contribute to the rejuvenation of economic cultures in the Union. The field research is carried out in four East-Central European countries (the Czech Republic, Hungary, Poland and Slovenia) and in four countries of Southeastern Europe (Bulgaria, Croatia, Romania and Serbia/Montenegro). DIOSCURI focuses on three research fields: entrepreneurship, governance and economic knowledge. The respective target groups for interviews and case studies are businesspeople, civil servants and economists, that is, important producers of economic culture. In addition, the project includes literature analysis and media reviews. CPS is the leader of a multinational consortium of 9 partners, with the support of the Institute for Human Sciences in Vienna, and the assistance of an International Advisory Board. To date, 72 case studies, 14 media reviews and 8 literature reviews have been produced. The consortium published extensively in English as well as in the national languages. ### *2.2.1 How transferable is the French social model? French multinational companies and their influence on the evolution of industrial relations in Bulgaria, Hungary and Poland (DARES)*

The DARES project is coordinated by the Working Lives Research Institute of London Metropolitan University, UK. The Center for Policy Studies is a partner in this consortium, together with the St Kliment Ohridski University of Sofia from Bulgaria and Bernard Brunhes Polska from Warsaw, Poland. The research aims to provide a detailed analysis of the ways in which French multinationals operating in the banking, retailing, hotel and energy sectors of three countries of Central and Eastern Europe have influenced the industrial relations systems of their host companies and countries through the transfer of procedural and/or substantive elements of the French social model. During the period between October 2005 and summer 2006, the research methods have been finalized, agreements on access to target firms have been made, and interviews in each country have been conducted. The project is funded by the French Ministry of Labor.

## **2.3 EUROPEAN INTEGRATION AND POLICY-MAKING**

### *Feasibility Study for Consular and Visa Cooperation among the Visegrad States for Residents of Ukraine and Moldova*

Duration: September 2004 – October 2005

The project was carried out by a consortium of four research institutes/think tanks: the Institute of Public Affairs in Warsaw (IPA, the lead institution), Europeum Institute for European Policy in Prague, the Research Center of the Slovak Foreign Policy Association in Bratislava, and CPS in Budapest. The basic goal of the project was to test the feasibility of introducing a system of consular cooperation among the four Visegrad states with respect to the Ukraine and the Republic of Moldova in order to reduce the disruption of cross-border traffic caused by the V4's accession to the EU and the Schengen regime. Researchers mapped the current situation on the ground and conducted a feasibility study in relation to three principal areas: political will, compatibility of procedures and technology, and level of demand for facilitated access to visas. The project was funded by a grant from the Local Government and Public Service Reform Initiative of the Open Society Institute.

### 2.3.1 *The European Future of Turkey and Ukraine*

Duration: April 2005 – April 2006

Contact person: Agnes Batory

The project was carried out by a consortium of the Institute of Public Affairs (IPA) in Warsaw (the lead institution), Europeum Institute for European Policy in Prague, the Research Center of the Slovak Foreign Policy Association in Bratislava, and CPS. It dealt with Polish, Czech, Slovak and Hungarian policy debates on, and attitudes to, future or potential further rounds of EU enlargement to include Turkey and Ukraine in the EU. Drawing on public opinion data, a qualitative analysis of print media coverage, and interviews with opinion formers in the four countries, researchers compiled national studies on the basis of which a comparative analysis was undertaken. The research contrasts the discourses across the four



countries as well as with the debate on the European level, and draws implications and recommendations for increasing popular involvement in, and indirectly the legitimacy of, processes of further enlargement to include Turkey and Ukraine. The project was funded by a grant from the Local Government and Public Service Reform Initiative of the Open Society Institute.

## 2.4 GLOBALIZATION

### *Mapping Global Knowledge Networks (KNOWNET)*

This project was conducted by Professor Diane Stone as Marie Curie Chair. The research focus of the project was upon the policy-related roles of university research centers, consultancies, foundations, independent research institutes and think tanks, looking into the dynamic relationship between (global) governance and knowledge. The study went beyond false dichotomies of the separate worlds of (social) science research and that of policy making to argue that knowledge production is intimately bound with new modes of governance. The objective was to draw together themes in the social science literature on how research relates to policy-making and vice-versa but to dramatically extend and up-date this literature by taking it beyond its methodological focus on what happens inside the nation-state to address global and regional dynamics. The project was funded by Diane Stone's Marie Curie grant from the European Commission.

*2.4.1 Political Consequences of Anti-Americanism*

The fundamental ambition of the research project on anti-Americanism was to promote a critical investigation of the forms, functions, and consequences of current anti-Americanism. Anti-Americanism has been explored in diverse settings from international trade to domestic and foreign policy agendas, from the workings of multilateral institutions to the appearance of new social and political movements. The project was especially interested in promoting greater understanding of how anti-Americanism appears in specific countries and regions. Among others, the project has commissioned studies that examine the historical origins, recent manifestations and policy applications of the phenomenon. The research director of the project was Ivan Krastev, chairman of the board of Center for Liberal Strategies in Bulgaria. Project activities have been carried out within the Center for Policy Studies until July 2006. Since the academic year 2006/2007, the initiative has become independent and is now called Open Century Project, a separate unit within CEU. Project activities have been sponsored by CEU, the European Commission's Marie Curie grant, the German Marshall Fund and the Tipping Point Foundation, Bulgaria.

#### 2.4.2 *Global Governance, Regionalization and Regulation: The Role of the EU (GARNET)*

GARNET is a Network of Excellence on *Global Governance, Regionalization and Regulation: The Role of the EU*, funded under the European Commission's 6th Framework Program. It comprises of 43 leading research centers and universities, including CEU. It is coordinated by the Centre for the Study of Globalization and Regionalization at the University of Warwick. GARNET's aim is to develop a world-class multi-disciplinary network of scientific excellence of researchers, analysts and practitioners with expertise in key issues and themes in global and regional governance. Particular focus is placed on: (i) those elements of the global regulatory framework (trade, finance, security) that (to a greater or lesser extent) structure the modern world system and (ii) an analysis of Europe's role within that framework. CPS plays an active role in the network: in Mobility Actions, Agnes Batory serves as a member of the

Garnet mobility committee, and Violetta Zentai contributes to the work package 'Gender in International Political Economy' (GIPE). CPS has also hosted several public events in the first year of the project.

## 2.5 RURAL DEVELOPMENT

### *Evaluating the Impact of the SAPARD program in Central and Eastern Europe*

CPS was a partner in a seven country study evaluating the impact of the EU's pre-accession program for agriculture and rural development. Coordinated by the European Institute from Sofia, Bulgaria, and funded by the Local Government and Public Service Reform Initiative (OSI), this was the first policy research study into the effectiveness of the program and the degree to which it had prepared new member states for complying with EU laws and methods of public administration. In collaboration with two colleagues from the Hungarian Academy of Sciences, CPS produced the Hungarian country case study and presented this at the public launch of the report in Sofia, in April 2005.

### 2.5.1 Land Reform and Rural Development in the former Soviet Union

Duration: 2003 – ongoing

This ongoing research has been carried out in collaboration with the International Policy Fellowship program and the Open Society Forum, Mongolia. The aim has been to investigate variations in land policies in the former Soviet Union and compare their impacts on rural development. So far, CPS has taken part in policy studies on land reform and rural development in the Ukraine, Kazakhstan and Mongolia. The research has included detailed legal analyses, sociological studies of rural transition and evaluation of alternative policy decisions. With the Open Society Forum and the Administration of Land Affairs, Geodesy and Cartography in Mongolia, CPS designed the workshop 'International Conference on Land reforms in Transition Countries'. CPS has also collaborated with the Local Government Initiative (LGI) on a research project on rural development and local public services. In April, CPS wrote a LGI sponsored project call for proposals dealing with how local authorities supply public services to rural areas. CPS helped select the final applicants and the outcomes of this work are expected at the end of 2006.

## 2.6 SOCIAL CAPITAL

### *The Challenge of Socio-economic Cohesion in the Enlarged European Union (SOCCOH)*

Duration: February 2006 – January 2008

This research project is led by the European Institute of the London School of Economics and investigates the role of social capital and civil society in achieving the goals of development policy in Europe. Specifically, the research looks at the relationship between social partnerships and improving levels of administrative capacity. Research is conducted in non-Cohesion countries (Germany and Italy), old Cohesion countries (Greece and Spain), CEE (Czech Republic, Hungary, and Poland) and candidate countries (Bulgaria and Romania) of the EU. It focuses on identifying the patterns of interactions between the levels of social capital and the capacity of civil society to choose effective and efficient development policy strategies and implementation processes to achieve the goal of sustainable development. CPS assembled a research team of six researchers (two from the Hungarian Academy of Sciences, one from the University of Pecs, one PhD student from CEU and one from Eotvos Lorand University) to carry out background literature review and empirical fieldwork. The project is funded through the 6<sup>th</sup> Framework Program of the European Commission.

### *2.6.1 Social Cohesion, Trust and Participation: Social Capital, Social Policy and Social Cohesion in the European Union and Candidate Countries*

This network of researchers examining the importance of social capital for social policy is a project coordinated by the London School of Economics. The aim is to demonstrate the ways in which informal and formal social networks influence social policy making and implementation in seven member states and the two candidate countries. Focusing on five policy issues including pre-school education and the role of social capital in reducing old age dependency, the Network reports to the EU's Directorate-General for Employment and Social Affairs and the studies feed into their annual Social Situation Report.

CPS worked with the Hungarian Academy of Sciences and the Central Statistical Office to produce the country report for Hungary. The Commission accepted the Network's first report in August 2006.

## 2.7 SOCIAL DIVERSITY AND EQUAL OPPORTUNITIES

The European Coalition for Community Living (ECCL) works towards the social inclusion of people with disabilities by promoting the provision of comprehensive, quality community-based services as an alternative to institutionalization. CPS is one of the Management Partners of ECCL, along with the Open Society Mental Health Initiative, Inclusion Europe, Autism Europe, the European Disability Forum, Mental Health Europe and the European Network of Independent Living. ECCL advocates for and monitors progress towards de-institutionalization in Europe, campaigns for, and provides information on, the development of comprehensive, quality community-based services and de-institutionalization. It is a cross-disability initiative and targets, among others, policy and decision makers, disability organizations and service providers. Since its founding, ECCL has grown into a network of organizations and individuals in 22 European countries and has established cooperation with the European Commission and a number of other organizations and de-institutionalization initiatives. In June 2006, the Management Partners adopted the Strategic Plan for 2006-2008, with a set of long-term and strategic objectives for community inclusion of people with disabilities, and in consultation with ECCL members. As one of its ongoing activities, ECCL publishes a quarterly web-based newsletter and has launched a new website on [www.community-living.info](http://www.community-living.info). This initiative is funded by contribution fees of its Management Partners and members.

### 2.7.1 Policy Frames and Implementation Problems: The Case of Gender Mainstreaming (MAGEEQ)

Duration: January 2003 – December 2005

Contact person: Andrea Krizsan

MAGEEQ was a three-year long research project funded within the European Commission's 5<sup>th</sup> Framework Program. It was a comparative study conducted by a consortium lead by the Institute for Human Sciences in Vienna, in partnership with the University of Nijmegen, Complutense University of Madrid, the Peace Institute in Ljubljana, and the Institute for Urban and Rural Sociology in Athens. The aim of the project was to examine the framing of gender equality policies through the comparative analysis of relevant policy documents in the Netherlands, Austria, Spain, Greece, Slovenia, Hungary and the European Union. The goal of the project was to assess differences and inconsistencies in gender equality policy frames between national and EU levels. The three specific policy fields analyzed were gender equality in politics, domestic violence and family policy. The project was concluded in 2005, and activities during this year focused on finalizing the comparative work, as well as on disseminating the results and raising awareness over the findings. Comparative reports were prepared in domestic violence, in political representation of women and in family policy. National and EU level workshops and debates were organized for all relevant stakeholders for gender equality policies, including public administrators, experts and NGOs.

### 2.7.2 Roma Women's Policy Fellowship

Duration: December 2005 – July 2006

Contact person: Lilla Jakobsz

In cooperation with the Open Society Institute's Network Women's Program and the Roma Women's Initiative, a policy fellowship program was established in order to ensure that Roma women's issues are included in OSI's *On the Road to EU. Monitoring Equal Opportunities for Women and Men in South Eastern Europe 2006* monitoring reports that focus on gender equality in the labor-market, and in the long run, to contribute to a more gender-sensitive strategic discourse on Roma issues at the national and European Union level. Research was conducted through data collection and qualitative interviews in Central and South-eastern Europe, gathering information on the employment situation of Roma women in Albania, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Bulgaria, the Czech Republic, Croatia, Hungary, Kosovo, Macedonia, Romania, Serbia and Montenegro, and Slovakia. The summaries of findings were compiled in the form of Fact Sheets about each country and published together with the OSI monitoring reports. The reports, together with the Fact Sheets on Roma Women's Employment were presented at a conference held in the European Parliament on May 3, 2006. The conference was hosted by Zita Gurmai, President of the PES Women, Vice-chairperson of the Committee on Women's Rights and Gender Equality.

### 2.7.3 *Women, Integration and Prison. Analysis of the Processes of Socio-Labor Integration of Women Prisoners in Europe (MIP)*

Duration: November 2002 – April 2005

Contact person: Lilla Jakobsz

Funded by the European Commission's 5<sup>th</sup> Framework Program, the MIP project aimed to investigate the effectiveness of reintegration measures and policies targeted at women prisoners in France, Germany, Hungary, Italy, Spain, and the United Kingdom. The project was coordinated by SURT – Women's Association for Labor Insertion, a Spanish NGO, in partnership with academic research institutions and NGOs from the participating countries. The research placed emphasis on the efficiency of the social and penitentiary policies that promote women's social and labor integration and identified key factors that affect the social exclusion or integration of female offenders. The research included an analysis of the policy and legislative context in each country as well as an analysis of reinsertion measures, programs run by different state and non-state agencies during and after imprisonment. Reports were produced on the demographic, socio-economic and penitentiary aspects of the national legislation and corresponding policy work in every country. The effectiveness of work, education and training programs, measures for ensuring housing, health -and substance abuse treatment in women's prisons, measures impacting social contacts and family relations as well as economic resources were addressed in separate reports. The project produced country studies and comparative reports, both in English and in the national languages. Policy recommendations aimed at European as well as national institutions were presented at the project's final conference held in Barcelona in April 2005. A final volume of research findings was published in June 2005.

## 2.8 IPF FACULTY FELLOWS' AND VISITING SCHOLARS' RESEARCH

### Aleg Cherp

Associate Professor, CEU Department of Environmental Sciences and Policy

IPF Faculty Fellow, January 2005 – December 2006

Aleg Cherp's main research interest is sustainable development policy and planning. His topic for the fellowship was devising innovative methods for evaluating National Sustainable Development Strategies. The aim was to include both the context and the dynamics of these strategies, testing it on cases in Belarus, Hungary and Sweden. The project was connected to research activities of CEU's MSc and PhD students and linked to the Swedish "MiSt" research program. Aleg Cherp's research from this study will be available in the CPS Policy Study Series in 2007.

### Gabor Toka

Associate Professor, CEU Department of Political Science  
IPF Faculty Fellow, January – July 2005

The aim of Gabor Toka's Faculty Fellowship *The Dispersion of Various Information Shortcuts and Election Outcomes* was to investigate the impact of citizens' political information level on election outcomes, and spell out the policy implications. Election outcomes can be a public good if their production influences the welfare of citizens, depends on the contribution of many individuals and where the impact on their welfare is, for all practical purposes, independent from their contribution. In this sense, elections create the familiar free-rider problem with respect to citizen participation, and the political information level that they acquire before deciding about their vote. Normally, this collective action problem is expected to be bridged by information shortcuts. The study used simulations based on real-world survey data to examine the effectiveness of various information shortcuts in helping uninformed voters to emulate fully-informed voting behavior among people with similar underlying preferences. Gabor Toka published extensively during his fellowship.

### Diana Urge-Vorsatz

Associate Professor, CEU Department of Environmental Sciences and Policy  
IPF Faculty Fellow, September 2003 – December 2006  
(on maternity leave from January 2004 – April 2006)

Diana Urge-Vorsatz began her IPF research in 2003, and after a period of maternity leave, she resumed her fellowship in May 2006. The aim of her Faculty Fellowship *Sustainable energy policy for EU accession countries* is to review the progress that has been achieved during a decade of transitions in Central European energy sectors, and to identify the remaining policy agenda to be implemented to complete the restructuring in CEE energy markets. The perspective of this review is to understand the sustainability of the energy sectors, thus, the emphasis of this research is on characteristics which fundamentally determine the sustainability of these industries, including the development of energy demand, energy and carbon intensities, and renewable energy production. Since the topic embraces a wide range of issues including a multitude of countries and fuels, concrete examples are drawn from the electricity sector of four accession (now member) countries, Hungary, Poland, Slovakia and the Czech Republic. The research aims to conclude with a portfolio of policy instruments which are recommended as a result of this research to promote energy efficiency and renewable energy in liberalized energy markets in CEE.

### Umida Khusankhodjaeva

Open Society Justice Initiative and CPS Resident Fellow, January 2005 – December 2006

Umida Khusankhodjaeva is a research fellow working on a joint project between OSJI and CPS on *Seeking Legal Remedies for Torture in Central Asia*. The project aims to support the victims of torture in obtaining redress through domestic and international legal fora by providing qualified legal counsel for domestic litigation and supporting further application, where appropriate, to the UN Human Rights Committee or other available international mechanism. The project operates within the legal framework



provided by the national legislation and international law applicable in Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, Tajikistan and Uzbekistan.

#### Thomas Pfister

PhD candidate, Queen's University, Belfast

Visiting Scholar, April – August 2006

Thomas Pfister is a PhD student at Queen's University in Belfast, and as a visiting scholar at CPS, he worked on his research focusing on *The Changing Nature of Citizenship in the European Union: Implementing Gender Equality in the UK, Germany and Hungary*. The research focuses on the gender equality dimension of the European Employment Strategy/Lisbon Strategy. It investigates EU influences in this area in Germany, Hungary and the UK. The aim is to generate knowledge about current transformations of social and economic citizenship in the transnationalizing context of European integration, as well as to enable normative and critical judgments about the direction and implications of these processes.



## 3 TEACHING AT CENTRAL EUROPEAN UNIVERSITY

### 3.1 MASTER'S PROGRAM IN PUBLIC POLICY

#### *Admissions*

Having been launched in September 2004, the 2005–06 academic year was the second of the Master's Program in Public Policy. The program received 188 applications for this year, up by over 50 from the previous year. 25 students and 3 visiting students were enrolled in September 2005, which represents an over twofold growth of the student body in merely one year. 147 applications were received in spring 2006 for the third year of the program, indicating that the CEU MPP degree is now well established. The student body is diverse both in terms of nationalities and backgrounds, but many already have significant public sector work experience.

#### *Administration and status*

Professor Diane Stone, Marie Curie Chair and the first head of the MPP, played a key role in launching the program and leading it through its first year. Professor Stone returned to her permanent position at Warwick University in fall 2005. George Guess, director for research at the Local Government Initiative of the Open Society Initiative took over as Acting Head for academic year 2005–06. In addition to existing faculty (Uwe Puetter and Prof Lajos Bokros, a joint appointment with the Economics Department) Alex Fischer was appointed as full time assistant professor. CPS researchers Violetta Zentai, Andrew Cartwright and Agnes Batory contributed courses to the program.

A major new development of the end of the 2005–06 academic year was the decision on the establishment of a new Department of Public Policy (DPP), which takes over the MPP as of academic year 2006–07. The department will be headed by Uwe Puetter (promoted to associate professor), with Henriett Griecs as department coordinator. Agnes Batory will share her time between the two units, with a joint appointment as assistant professor and CPS research fellow. The DPP and CPS will continue to closely collaborate on teaching, capacity building and research.

#### *Program and streams*

In academic year 2005–06 the MPP curriculum consisted of 34 credits of core and elective courses, a dissertation (6 credits) and an internship program. The program benefited from the contribution of Valentina Dimitrova–Grajzl, visiting professor, as well as visiting professors recruited through the Center for Media and Communication Studies. Professors from the Center for Academic Writing, the Department



of Economics as well as Open Society Institute Local Government Initiative (LGI) and World Bank specialists also taught courses. The curriculum also consisted of cross-listed courses from other CEU departments.

In addition to the two pre-existing streams in Decentralized Governance and International Policy Practice, respectively, a third stream was opened in Media, Information and Telecommunications Policy. The Decentralized Governance stream is supported by the Fiscal Decentralization Initiative and the Local Government Initiative of the Open Society Institute, which together sponsored 15 students' scholarships in 2005-06. The Media, Information and Telecommunications Policy stream was launched in cooperation with CEU's Center for Media and Communications Studies and Matav, a Hungarian telecommunications company, which also provides four scholarships annually for three years.

### *Accreditation*

In addition to the MPP's existing registration by the Board of Regents of the New York State Education Department, a process is underway to accredit a 2-year-long MA with the Hungarian Accreditation Committee. CEU is member of a consortium of Hungarian universities seeking accreditation of public policy as a field of study, on the basis of which individual degrees, including the CEU MPP, will be accredited in Hungary.

### *Partnerships and major new initiatives*

In consortium with the University of York, the Institute of Social Studies in the Hague, and the Barcelona Institute of International Studies CPS submitted a revised proposal to the European Commission's Erasmus Mundus Program, for the establishment of a jointly administered international Masters course in Public Policy (MUNDUS MAPP). CPS is the lead institution of the consortium. The proposal was selected for funding as the first in public policy, and as the first offered by a consortium led by a



Hungarian academic institution. Over a period of five years, the MUNDUS MAPP program will provide full scholarships to approximately 120 students and up to 20 visiting scholars from outside Europe. The program will be launched in September 2007/08, with recruitment and admissions starting in fall 2006.

Discussions also started with the University of Witten-Herdecke (which had been the first German private university) regarding the development of a joint MA degree program in Public Policy and Management. Students for the program will be recruited in China, and collaboration would include the offering of preparatory courses locally. Discussions continue in academic year 2006-07, with a view to the arrival of the first students from China in 2007-08.

### 3.2 CONTRIBUTION TO OTHER CEU DEPARTMENTS

Violetta Zentai taught a course at the Department of Sociology and Social Anthropology both in the 2004/05 and 2005/06 academic years: *Cultures of capitalism: an anthropological reading of post-socialist economic transformation*.

Violetta Zentai supervised numerous M.A. theses and also served on 2 PhD committees of students from the Political Science Department.

## 4 CAPACITY BUILDING

### 4.1 INTERNATIONAL POLICY FELLOWSHIP PROGRAM

In 2005–06, CPS continued to work closely with the International Policy Fellowship (IPF) program of the OSI. The program supported two tracks, one for IPF fellows, and another for CEU faculty (IPF Faculty Fellowships).

In the former, Fellows began their 2005–06 term in April 2005, being separated into six different working groups, each of which addressed a topic of significant interest to the Open Society Institute. Topics covered in this year included 'Combating the Resource Curse', 'Promoting Open Societies in Muslim Countries', 'The Challenge of Wider Europe' and the question of 'Roma Exclusion'. CPS helped in selecting these topics, in the selection and recruitment of fellows, designing meetings and workshops and generally helping orient the fellows and the new group mentors into the program. CPS staff continued to act as mentors and advisors, connecting fellows to interested CEU colleagues as well as to OSI network programs in Budapest and elsewhere. Many of the papers from the IP fellows appear on the Policy Documentation Center site and, with the assistance of 7 former CEU master students and three current PhD candidates, CPS created a series of interactive promotional web pages for each working group, assembling and updating content throughout the year.

In the IPF Faculty Fellowship scheme, three CEU faculty members were awarded research grants in this reporting period (thus altogether eight CEU colleagues have now been the recipients of this generous support. Their research projects are listed under section 2.8 above.

Through this program, CPS helps maintain a strong bridge between academic and applied policy research, and between the university and the wider Soros network for the benefit of both students and faculty.

### 4.2 PUBLIC INTEGRITY EDUCATION NETWORK

Contact person: Agnes Batory

The Public Integrity Education Network (PIEN) was launched by Tiri, a London-based NGO, and CPS in 2004. PIEN is facilitated by a grant from the Open Society Institute to Tiri. The network was established with the following key objectives:



- to facilitate the development of effective, policy-oriented training and teaching programs on corruption control and organizational integrity;
- to bring together established, leading universities primarily from major regions of the world so that new training practices can enter into the mainstream and rapidly gain local legitimacy; and
- to build regional networks for joint research projects and the development of a pool of critical and independent case studies of reforms.

PIEN has developed as a loose and informal network of professionals (largely academics, researchers and NGO representatives) that provides peer support in curriculum development and teaching on public integrity and anti-corruption. Some of the network activities take place in face to face meetings, but relevant material is also being collected at a dedicated interactive website maintained by Tiri. Network building currently focuses on regional initiatives, where PIEN cultivate contacts with key partners acting as multipliers in their countries/regions.

CPS's role in the project has been to focus on capacity building. This is expressed, on the one hand, in curriculum development workshops, organized in cooperation with CEU's Curriculum Resource Center, as part of CRC course innovation sessions. These workshops provide practical help and conceptual foundations to academics wishing to introduce anti-corruption courses in the region. On the other hand, in the framework of CEU's Summer University series, CPS has co-organized summer university courses with Tiri's Fredrik Galtung as course director, which provide state-of-the-art training on corruption control and organizational integrity. The curriculum workshops draw approximately 15 international faculty participants, while SUN courses run with over 20 international participants from both academia and policy practice.

### 4.3 SUMMER UNIVERSITY COURSES

#### *Civil Society Organizations: Promoting Pro-Poor Policy and Social Inclusion*

July 11-15, 2005

The poor and marginalized tend to benefit when civil society organizations (CSOs) are engaged in shaping policy, particularly when engagement is well-informed and leads to evidence-based policy. This course, offered by Diane Stone (CPS) and John Young (Overseas Development Institute, ODI) as course directors, was designed to help CSOs make their engagement with policy processes and policy actors more effective and legitimate by cultivating improved understanding of policy entrepreneurship and policy making at local, national and international levels. From CPS staff, Violetta Zentai and Uwe Puetter also contributed to the course, which drew mid-level managers, researchers and communications officers from think tanks and NGOs, and doctoral candidates. 25 people took part in the course which received 75 applications. The summer school was supported by the European Commission under its Marie Curie Actions.

#### *4.3.1 Strategic Corruption Control and Organizational Integrity*

July 4-15, 2005

In this first summer university course organized by CPS and Tiri within the framework of the Public Integrity Education Network, 25 people participated, selected from nearly twice as many applicants. They were drawn predominantly from civil society organizations and researchers from a wide range of countries from Yemen and Nigeria to Georgia. The course director was Fredrik Galtung, and resource persons included international lawyer Mark Pieth, Transparency International founder Jeremy Pope, and Howard Whitton of OECD Sigma, among others. Participants rated the course 4.22 on an overall satisfaction scale from 1 to 5. The course was funded with SUN resources and a contribution from the PIEN grant provided by the Open Society Institute.

#### *4.3.2 Strategic Corruption Control and Organizational Integrity*

July 3-12, 2006



The second summer university organized by CPS and Tiri within the framework of the Public Integrity Education Network already drew applications based on recommendations of the first SUN course participants. Application numbers increased by over 50%, and 19 participants were selected to attend the course. The course director was Fredrik Galtung, with many of the 2005 course lecturers returning as well as a number of new resource persons coming on board. Participants rated the course 3.33 on an overall satisfaction scale from 1 to 4. The course was funded with SUN resources, scholarships from INTAS (International Association for the Promotion of Co-operation with Scientists from the New Independent States of the Former Soviet Union) and a contribution from the PIEN grant provided by the Open Society Institute.

#### 4.4 CURRICULUM DEVELOPMENT WORKSHOPS

##### *University Teaching about Corruption and Anti-corruption*

Curriculum Resource Center – CPS workshop, March 21–25, 2005

In this week-long workshop, organized in CRC's course innovation workshop series, 14 lecturers from universities mainly in the former Soviet Union received training. The participants were selected on the basis of a competitive call for applications. The workshop provided general teaching skills and methods training by CRC colleagues, and subject specific content from experienced lecturers invited by CPS within the framework of the Public Integrity Education Network. The aim was to provide practical assistance to the participants in designing and introducing courses on corruption and corruption control in their home institutions. The participating lecturers each developed new courses. The workshop was supported by CRC grants to participants, and a contribution from the PIEN grant from OSI to cover the resource persons' costs.

##### *4.4.1 University Teaching about Corruption and Anti-corruption*

Curriculum Resource Center – CPS workshop, April 3–7, 2006

17 university lecturers were selected from almost twice as many applications to participate in this second CRC–CPS workshop, which run along the same lines as the 2005 event. New resource persons included Tiri's Nick Duncan. As a result of the workshop, the participants each developed course syllabi



on corruption and anti-corruption, in a variety of disciplines and countries (again predominantly in the former Soviet Union). Similarly to the 2005 workshop, CRC provided grants to participants, and a contribution from the PIEN grant from OSI was used to cover the resource persons' costs.

#### 4.5 POLICY DOCUMENTATION CENTER

Contact person: Andrew Cartwright

Launched in 2003, the Policy Documentation Center has grown to be the largest single collection of policy papers from the CEE and FSU region on the web. Between January 2005 and August 2006, the numbers of papers in the collection increased to just under 2000. The database has become increasingly well used and visitors' figures are an average of 50,000 per month. CPS expanded the collection to include papers from governments and ministries in the region and secured funding from the Central European Initiative for this purpose as well as for making the database better known. Increasingly, the geographical scope of the database is growing, with more contributions from Central Asia and the Caucasus. The project has enabled CEU students to contribute as editors, abstract writers, feature providers and correspondents.
